INTRODUCTION

Background



An Coimisiún Toghcháin has established a new longitudinal National Election and Democracy Study (NEDS) for Ireland as a key element of its Research Programme. This is similar to the National Election Studies which have been in place in other countries for many years but NEDS also includes a particular focus on certain areas related to the role of An Coimisiún.

The purpose of this survey was to gather data in relation to Ireland's first ever Mayoral Election in Limerick including voting experience, voters' electoral knowledge and information sources used. As is the norm with National Election Studies, questions were also included around how and why voters voted as they did in the Mayoral, Local and European Elections on 7th June 2024 and their attitudes to particular political topics.

Specific areas covered are:

- > perceptions of the voting experience, voter registration process and management of elections in Ireland;
- > what sources of information were used to inform the voting decision;
- overall understanding and perceived priorities for the incoming Mayor;
- how people voted in in each election, and various factors that may have informed their Mayoral vote;
- > attitudes, beliefs and knowledge on a range of social issues and perceptions of government performance drawing on best practice and questions used in international election studies to facilitate future comparative research.



Methodology




- In total, 894 interviews were conducted among voters exiting polling stations, after casting their ballots in the 7th June 2024 Limerick Mayoral, European and Council elections.
- > 52 polling stations were randomly sampled throughout Limerick City and County, with the sample of stations stratified by size of polling station. Some adjustments were made to ensure that the selected polling stations were spread evenly across constituency.
- > Each selected polling station was assigned a 3 or 4 hour interviewing shift, with interviewing shifts spread throughout the day.
- At each polling station, the Ipsos B&A interviewer positioned themselves near the exit and randomly selected voters to participate in the survey using a 'very next person' technique.
- Approximately 20 interviews were conducted at each polling station.
- Each voter selected to participate completed a survey of approx. 6 minutes in length, administered by the Ipsos B&A interviewer via a CAPI (computer aided personal interviewing) device.
- > The resulting data was subsequently weighted to adjust for the estimated flow of voters throughout the day. Further weights were included to account for lower numbers of interviews being achieved at certain types of polling stations.
- > The statistical margin for error is approximately 3% for results to questions asked of all respondents.













Ease of accessing polling station








Ballot papers easy to understand or not easy to understand



Did you register to vote online or by completing a paper form?










Mayoral vote - 1st and 2nd preference vote






Mayoral candidate - Survey results versus election result













European Parliament Election 1st Preference Vote


Q.6 In relation to the European Parliament election, to which party or independent candidate did you give your first preference vote?

Local Council Elections – 1st Preference vote









Satisfaction with national government



Government satisfaction by candidate/party voted for




